Did You Know?

58% of MD 8th graders are reading below proficient 76% of MD 4th grade low-income students read below proficient 82% of 4th fourth grade MD ELL read below proficient 83% of students with disabilities in MD read below proficient (NAEP, 2013)

Prevalence of dyslexia is one in five or 15% to 20% with only 5% identified (Shaywitz, M.D., 2004)
